## *For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain*

(adapted from the morning sermon on the 12th January)

This month was the anniversary of the death of Jim Elliot and four other young men who gave their life to reach the Auca people, in the Ecuadorian rain forest, with the Gospel. These men were murdered by the very people they were trying to reach.

In 1948, Jim Elliott wrote in his journal, "I seek not a long life, but a full one, like you, Lord Jesus."

This statement would come true. Jim Elliott and his fellow missionaries were killed on January 8, 1956. What has happened to the Auca people since then is proof that the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church. Many Aucas are now Christians. The Church in this area grew.

Jim Elliott was a man who had gone **ALL FOR JESUS**. The words spoken by the Apostle Paul were also true for Jim Elliott: "*For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain.*" (Philippians 1:21)

Here at LBC, as a local community of faith, this is our verse for the year. We are a people who are striving to give **all of our lives to Jesus and not just a part.**

The Apostle Paul had been dramatically converted on the Road to Damascus in an encounter with the Risen Lord Jesus Christ. From this point on, the man who was known as Saul, a great persecutor of Christians, became Paul the great missionary who lived **ALL FOR JESUS**.

He travelled far and wide preaching the Gospel, planting Churches and encouraging believers.

This letter to the Church at Philippi was written during Paul's first Roman imprisonment, during 60-63 A.D. Paul was in Chains for Christ. (Philippians 1:12-14)

- Because of Paul's chains, **Christ was known** (Phil 1:13)
- Because of Paul's critics **Christ was preached** (Phil 1:18)
- But because of Paul's crisis, **Christ was magnified** (Phil 1:20)

Despite Paul's suffering, persecution and imprisonment his desire was that Christ would be magnified. "Magnify means: "to make or declare great, and to increase". Paul's attitude was "No matter which way things go, I want Christ to be made to look great and I want him to increase". He lived a life that magnified the Saviour. How?

- By exercising a **complete dependence on Christ** (v 19)

Paul was in a rough situation. He was in prison for preaching the Gospel and fellow Christians were trying to make it harder on him.

Yet Paul is a man at peace, completely dependent upon his Saviour. In Philippians 1:19 Paul is saying:"I know that everything will be alright. God is in control."

- By possessing a **determination to stand for Christ** (v 20)

I love Paul's determination. He has been travelling and preaching the Gospel. He wasn't ashamed of the Gospel. Now that he has been arrested for this, the temptation would be to back off a bit, to tone it down a bit. However, Paul expresses in verse 20 the determination that he would continue to boldly stand for Christ. Paul is saying: "No matter which way things go (Life or death), I want to boldly magnify Jesus Christ."

- By exhibiting a consuming desire to serve Christ (v 21-26)

Paul expressed his commitment to Christ v21 when he said "For to me to live is Christ, but to die is gain." Paul was torn between the two. Yes, dying, would be his gain, but living would mean he could help advance Christ and his cause and bring forth more spiritual fruit. What a consuming passion to serve Christ! Can you honestly say: "*For me to live is Christ.*" If we are to magnify Christ, there must be a consuming passion to serve Christ. He must be first and be the reason we live.

As a Church we have committed to go all in for Jesus: to stake all we are and have on Him, for His glory and for His fame. Consequently, our verse for the year is Philippians 1v21: "*For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain.*"





## Christmas Cantata

On the evening of the 13 December at 7.30 pm there was a lot of anxiety and nervousness as months of hard work and practice by choir members and musicians came to fruition when the first performance of the Cantata "Christmas is Coming – Sing for Joy" was about to start. During the previous 30-45 minutes the church had gradually filled and there was an air of expectancy as the evening started with the audience singing two or three familiar carols following which the Cantata began. The church was full – with just over two hundred people filling the increased seating area following the refurbishment. The powerful words of each song and narration, and the musical accompaniment was met with much applause and after a short word from Rae everyone was invited into the hall for refreshments. This was the pattern for the following two nights as well. Over the three evenings more than 600 people came into the church to hear the Cantata, many of them people who perhaps would not normally come into a church. The Cantata told the Christmas story in modern language as well as including some traditional songs and was set to a lively modern accompaniment which had touched the hearts of the choir and musicians.

Our grateful thanks go to Julie and Brian for the hours of hard work they put in patiently teaching us our parts and arranging the music for the instruments. It also gave all of us a chance to get to know people as we worked together practising but as well as the hard work we also had a lot of fun.

On Friday and Saturday there was a free will offering for the work of *Centre of Hope – GLIA* in Romania which raised a magnificent £2800 which will help greatly with the work at the Centre, especially at this time of year.

## A Big Thank You!

We would like to give a big thank you on behalf of the charity and especially the beneficiaries in Romania to all those who donated to *Centre of Hope – GLIA* at the very successful Cantata performances on in December. An amazing sum of £2819.03 was raised which is the equivalent of providing 1,762 three course meals (approximately 1 ½ months) at the Centre for those that live in desperate circumstances. For many of those that come for the meals it is the only time that they will have a nutritious, hot meal and it is so appreciated. Once again thank you for your support and donations.





## **New Year Message from Alan Donaldson General Director, Baptist Union of Scotland**

On 18 September 2014, you will be asked to vote in a referendum on the question: 'Should Scotland be an independent country?' There will be many factors that will influence your decision, as to whether you vote 'yes' or 'no' in answer to this question.

The White Paper, "Scotland's Future", looks to express the Scottish Government's view on this issue; and seeks to answer many questions on the topic of independence. The Church is mentioned only a few times in the Paper, mostly with reference to our significant place in Society and the historic place of the Church of Scotland. Question 590 asks, "What will be the position of churches and religion in an independent Scotland?". The answer given is, "We propose no change to the legal status of any religion or of Scotland's churches." An issue of particular importance to Baptists is that of religious freedom for all. The answer to question 608 speaks of, "freedom of speech, association, conscience and religion", as being protected through the European Convention on Human Rights in an independent Scotland.

There are, in addition, a number of issues spoken of in this White Paper that are of great importance to us, as members of Christ's church. As a people who pray, "Your Kingdom come", we look to be as 'salt and light' within our culture, introducing and supporting Jesus-centred, Biblical themes to the society in which we live. Our partners at Jubilee Scotland have already welcomed the commitment that debt relief has been highlighted as the second priority in the international section. This is just one example of how, as Christians, the wider report is important to us all. The White Paper shares vision, hopes and aspirations in many areas, including those of economy, environment, education, justice and health.

At the beginning of this New Year, I want to encourage all within our churches to prayerfully engage with this significant debate in our Nation. As we do so, let us bring something of Christ's willingness to serve and to consider the needs of others. I would want us to heed the words of our First Minister in this report; but probably not in a way imagined by him. Alex Salmond wrote, "The year ahead should be a national celebration of who we are and what we could be." It would be good for our churches to remember who we are, as Jesus Christ's disciples, at the beginning of this year; and not to lose track of it as the year unfolds. In God's Word, the letter of 1st Peter reminds us that, although at times we may feel like aliens and strangers, we are the living stones built together by Christ and on Christ, our cornerstone.

We also need to be reminded of what we could be. Jesus said, "I will build my church". In the last couple of years, we have begun to see small signs of growth in our churches, across the nation. We believe that this is simply the beginning of a growing fruitfulness that stems from faithful witness. I pray that we will all grow in a vision, not just of what Church can look like in the coming years, but also what it will mean to see Christ's Kingdom come in increasing measure in our nation of Scotland in the years to come.

*'Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper.'* Jeremiah 29

### **Baroque from Bangkok: exquisite jewellery handmade by women from the Red Light district**

Sales from a BMS mission worker's first jewellery collection are helping Thai women build a new life away from the sex industry.

### **Ever made jewellery? For some of us, it might be a hobby. If you are really good at it you may start selling some of your creations to friends and family or even at craft fairs.**

Sarah Brown, a BMS World Mission worker in Bangkok, Thailand, once made jewellery for fun too. Now she is designing jewellery collections to be handmade by talented women who have escaped the other main business in their district – the sex trade.


Since July 2013 Sarah has been working full time for BMS partner NightLight. NightLight has been making jewellery for the last eight years to raise money for its work amongst women in the sex industry and also to give these women a new trade to help them escape it.

In her first two months at NightLight, Sarah started working on designs for her jewellery collection. Collaborating with another designer, Sarah researched general fashion trends to see what may be popular with customers, something she used to do before she started to serve with BMS.

"I have been working in the same way as I did when I was in the fashion industry," says Sarah. "I have done a bit of trend forecasting and researching, looking at the season's trends and colours, what went before and what is the trend that is coming in. It is also remembering the demographic of our customers as well."

At the end of September the jewellery was launched on the NightLight International [web store](#) and at a special party aimed at ex-pats in Bangkok. The [baking team](#) that Sarah is also helping to develop at NightLight baked focaccia bread for the event.

So what is Sarah's favourite piece of jewellery from her first collection? "I have two favourites, she says. "From the higher range it is two chains joined together with deep dark pearls, which is 1930s inspired and has a very vintage look about it. The other piece is baroque inspired and silvery blue – I like the style of it. It is nice to see it is doing quite well and customers like it too."

The most important thing for Sarah is that the women who work with her benefit financially and in their confidence.

"The important part is that every piece purchased actually goes to the ladies' salaries. It is not just some of it, it is all of it. When the money comes in for the jewellery, it goes toward the salary of the women.

"When I was doing this collection I didn't want it to be exclusive so that I was the only one giving ideas. I listen to the ladies' input. Even if the sample is done and we have gone into production, one of the ladies may turn round and say 'Actually that is too long, or maybe you should think about changing that colour, those beads are a bit too big.' I listen and I value their opinion because at the end of the day they are good at what they do.

By respecting their input it gives them encouragement that they are doing a good job, that what they are doing is worthwhile."
